



CORREDOR AZUL PROGRAMME

Launched in 2017, the Corredor Azul Programme connects people, nature, and economies along the Paraguay-Paraná wetland system. Covering approximately 400,000 km² it stands out as the world's largest fluvial wetland system.

The Programme strengthens wetland-related local communities, promotes better productive practices, supports the management of protected areas, and drives innovative solutions for conservation and sustainable development.

Its main goal is to ensure the health and connectivity of this wetland system, one of the last remaining free-flowing river corridors in the world. It sustains millions of people and is vital to addressing the climate crisis, conserving biodiversity, and ensuring community resilience.
